20 YEARS OF THE RRC

Since its formation the RRC has been the UK focus for developments in best practice river restoration and catchment management. River restoration has become a commonly used and understood term, so the emphasis of the RRC is now less on explaining the concept and more about providing independent targeted advice and support for its implementation, both strategic and practical. Now, entering its third decade, the three core focus areas of the RRC are:

- Information gathering and collation of evidence;
- Technical expertise and evaluation of implementation and cost effectiveness;
- Building capacity through training, publishing guidance and running river restoration network events.



2015 UK RIVER PRIZE

The Nigel Holmes Award for the UK River Prize will be awarded at the 16th RRC Annual Network Conference later this year. The 2015 UK River Prize will build upon last year and form a collaboration between England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland to contribute and celebrate best practice across the UK.

The winners will be presented with £10,000 and the Nigel Holmes Trophy in recognition of his lifelong contribution to river restoration.

The £10,000 prize fund is being spent on:

- · Developing relationships with universities and research institutes to build an evidence base for restoration
- Providing interpretation boards at key public access sites to highlight the conservation value of the river.
- Running a river restoration competition for communities along the Wensum.

MulkearLIFE is a five-year partnership based project working on the restoration of the Mulkear River catchment, which forms part of the Lower Shannon Special Area of Conservation (SAC). It is one of the most important integrated catchment management projects in Ireland and a flagship EU co-funded LIFE Nature project with a €1.75 million budget. Read more >>
