Who is it for? Fishery Trusts and District Salmon Fishery Boards, conservation bodies, local authorities, land and river managers and government agency staff

What is it about? Rivers are a significant feature of Scotland's natural heritage but are subjected to a multitude of pressures associated with an array of different uses including recreation, agriculture and industry. These pressures have altered the natural functioning of many river systems and so the mosaic of habitat and species they support. This two day workshop will explore how rivers function, how this natural functioning has been altered through human interference, and how it can be sympathetically restored and the benefits of doing so.
